Specific Diocesan Sources of Funding

Building Projects and Church Repairs The Erskine Muton Trust Fund (Registered Charity No 1130199) makes grants to Anglican churches in Dorset for church buildings. Grants are usually in the order of £5 - £10,000. The Trustees are HSBC fund managers and grant allocations are made on the recommendation of a diocesan review committee. Pastoral and Development Fund The Diocesan Board of Finance offers **loans** from the Pastoral and Development Fund for repair or construction projects on buildings in legal church ownership that will make an important contribution to the support and enhancement of mission and ministry in the parish. The available capital is limited and is normally used for a number of relatively short term loans of up to about £20,000. Applications for larger sums over longer periods however will also be considered. It is very unlikely that the DBF would approve a loan to a parish in arrears with payment of Share. The Salisbury Diocesan Social Welfare Fund

- Makes grants to promote Christian principles in human relationships and social morality within the Diocese of Salisbury.
- Provides grants of up to £400 for those smaller projects or ideas that can make a difference in your communities.

The trustees are currently encouraging parishes to look at becoming more energy efficient and using renewable energy and the fund has been able to contribute towards the costs of audits. But other ideas are welcome. Decisions on grants are made once a year in the late Autumn. The fund has also been a key supporter of the work of the Chaplain to Gypsies, Travellers, and Showmen. St Mary's Fund, Salisbury

- Makes grants to promote and maintain moral welfare in accordance with Christian principles mainly among girls and women in Salisbury Diocese.
- Provides grants of about £200 for single parents in need. Most grants are made following a referral from a Health Visitor or Social Worker but clergy may also make referrals.

The fund also supports some larger projects that provide services that may benefit single parent families such as the Mothers Union holiday scheme and work at women's refuges. Decisions on such grants are made in the late Autumn each year and applicants are encouraged to discuss proposals in advance with Colin Brady: 01258 839140 e-mail: colin.brady@salisbury.anglican.org

The Aldhelm Mission Fund is the dedicated fund for supporting new mission initiatives in parishes, schools and the wider community in the Diocese of Salisbury. It is intended specifically to encourage and resource creative thinking and risk-taking about new work and projects and to provide at least some of the resources needed to try different ways of mission in parishes. The emphasis is on supporting new areas of work that connect the local church to the wider community but cannot be funded from local sources. The Fund cannot support the maintenance of buildings.

Eleven local mission initiatives were supported by the Aldhelm Mission Fund in 2011. In addition to continuation funding for existing projects, a further £74,150 was awarded. New projects included the Motcombe Messy Church project, Walk West Dorset, Barford Contemporary Worship and support for the Salisbury Deanery Schools Chaplaincy. The awards ranged from £500 to £30,000. Since 2006, the Fund has supported over 50 local mission initiatives.
