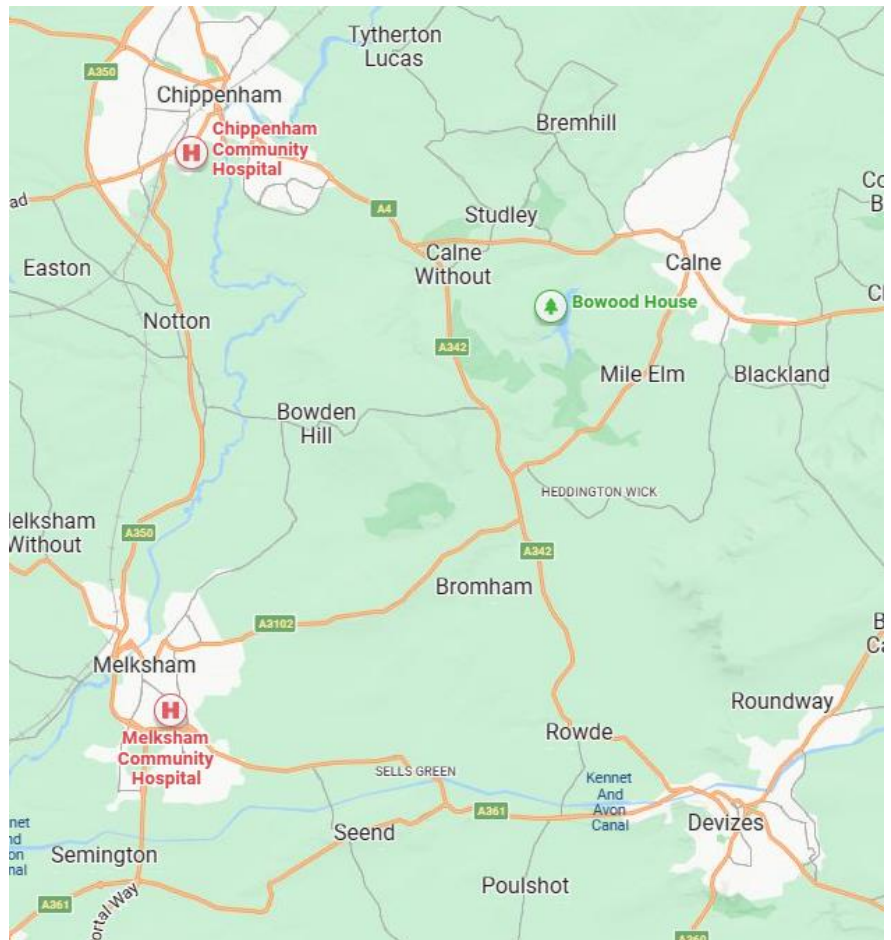

Profile for the appointment of Rector

Welcome

We're glad you're reading this profile and perhaps wondering if God is calling you to this exciting role in the Benefice of Rowde and Bromham.

The Benefice is a very pleasant place in which to live and work. It is located in attractive countryside between the towns of Devizes, Calne, Melksham and Chippenham. Both villages have a strong sense of community and have a selection of pubs, retail outlets and primary schools. For other facilities residents can choose between the four local towns, which are connected to the villages by bus. There are good transport links to the motorway network, Chippenham and Melksham both have railway stations and Bristol has an international airport.



The surrounding towns offer a range of good shopping, secondary schools, leisure facilities, dentists and doctors' surgeries. The larger town of Swindon and the cities of Bath, Bristol and Salisbury are within easy reach. Minor Injuries Units are situated in Trowbridge and Chippenham, with major hospitals in Bath, Bristol, Swindon and Salisbury. Devizes has an NHS Treatment Centre and a new NHS state-of-the-art health care facility which opened in 2022.

Our churches are open every day with displays of information in the porches as well as inside the buildings

Our Vision and Mission

- offering friendship, fellowship, prayer and support and pastoral care for everyone;
- grow in spirituality by offering teaching on Christian faith and life; embrace diversity;
- Continue to develop our work with children and young families;
- Continue to develop our collaboration as a benefice and with surrounding parishes.



Who and What We Are

Leadership – Our benefice has small but strong leadership teams, who bring with them the fruits of their experiences in worship, buildings, fundraising and finance. We also have a part time administrator to support our incumbent and associate priest. While we can sometimes disagree on approach, as PCCs we are committed to furthering the work of Christ in our benefice.

Each parish has a church with enviable history (both are mentioned in the *Domesday Book*). We also have a unique wooden and thatched church in the hamlet of Sandy Lane. While the parishes and churches each have their own traditions, they work collaboratively on Benefice-wide matters

Worship – Across the Benefice we have both traditional and more informal and modern styles of worship. We are open to change and diversity though not at the cost of some traditions. Non-Eucharistic services are often lay-led, we use the same service booklets for most services. We also have a “Growing in Faith” group exploring faith and examining its various issues. This group moved to Zoom during the Covid pandemic and has no plans to change this arrangement at present. All our churches are members of the Small Pilgrim Places Network

Our current pattern of worship has changed since the pandemic and this pattern has been maintained during the current vacancy with joint services to put less strain on our associate priest and retired clergy who have supported us in order to maintain as many of our normal services of worship as possible.

Children and families

We have a “Little Angels” parent and pre-school child group at Bromham who meet in the church twice a month and other venues for special events. It has proven very successful and is an important first step in bringing young families into church. Our Palm Sunday, Christingle and Christmas Eve crib services attract large numbers of families with young children.



Outreach

The Benefice Mothers' Union plays a vital role in the life of our churches as well as the wider community. Through its work in the Benefice it organises and funds holidays for under privileged families.

Both parishes have strong links with their parish councils often hosting events in our churches as well as at other venues and offering mutual support.

The Friends of Bromham and Sandy Lane churches and the Friends of St Matthews church are groups which raise and manage funds to assist in the maintenance of their churches and improvement of their fittings, furnishings and amenities.

We view pastoral care as a crucial part of ministry in the benefice. We have a small number of trained LPAs and would like to see more of these to support the incumbent and associate priest during the planning and running of baptisms, funerals, weddings and home communion.

Schools

Both our parishes have primary schools. Rowde is a Church of England Academy and Bromham is a Church of England voluntary controlled school.

Both schools have strong links with their churches and have a number of services in church throughout the year. There is a programme in each school of regular involvement by members of our congregations to spread the teachings of Jesus through buddy reading and the weekly "Open the Book" programme.

Social life

Our churches enjoy a wide range of social events such as harvest suppers, concerts and musical evenings, coffee mornings, Lent lunches and cream teas. St Nicholas church also hosts the Bromham Bash which is a fun evening of local entertainment, the Carnival Songs of Praise, an annual Christmas tree festival, and a biennial flower festival.





What We Offer

You will be ably supported in our benefice by very committed parochial church councils, our associate priest and a part-time Church Administrator working six hours per week. You will also enjoy the support of those who lead lay worship and a small number of lay pastoral assistants. as well as many willing and able members of the congregation supporting aspects of church life. You also have the support of your deanery and chapter colleagues.

Church Finance

Each parish in the benefice has its own treasurer and is responsible for its own finances and produces its own accounts. All our churches have been able to pay their Parish Share in full and are well supported by their congregations through standing orders, plate collections and donations even with a slight fall in numbers on the electoral roll. Both our PCCs' accounts have restricted and endowment funds for specific purposes and reserves that future proof our finances.

Bromham has a charity called the Bromham Church Estates Trust which has three properties in the village. The income can only be used to cover major building costs and can assist the PCC with insurance and energy costs. The new incumbent will be one of the trustees of this charity.

Accommodation

The Rectory is in Bromham High Street and close to the parish church and village amenities. The Rectory is a substantial and well-maintained modern four bedroomed detached family house. There is a generous garden, large garage and ample parking. Downstairs there is a large study, with direct access from the porch, and a good sized living room, dining room, WC, kitchen/breakfast room, utility room and access to the garage. There is gas-fired central heating and hot water.

Our New Priest

We are seeking and praying for a priest who will take us forward in our mission. We are looking for someone who -

Our Churches

St Matthews Church, Rowde - This Grade II* listed building and its churchyard are places of beauty. There has been a church on this site at least from the time of the first recorded Rector in 1326. By 1400 AD the church, dedicated to the Blessed Virgin Mary, was rebuilt and all that remains of the 15th Century building is the tower.



In 1833, the church was re-dedicated to St Matthew. The South and North Aisles were added in 1860, and in 1871 a new North porch was added. St Matthews is open every day from 10am to 4pm.

St Nicholas Church, Bromham - The church is Grade I listed. It is a beautiful building with a fascinating mix of architectural styles including Norman, English Gothic, small elements of Tudor, and Victorian. The church we see today was founded in 1076 and completed by 1084 and has been extensively added to and altered over the centuries. It has many fine features including the 15th century polychrome ceiling of the Bayntun chantry chapel (recognised as one of the most im-



portant in the country) and a fine early William Morris east window. The Irish poet Thomas Moore is buried in the churchyard and his memorial attracts many visitors from Ireland and America. St. Nicholas' church is open every day 9am to at least 5pm. The electoral role stands at 48.

St Mary the Virgin and St Nicholas Church, Sandy Lane – To counter the rise of Methodism, a site was given by Captain Wyndham of Wans House to build a wooden and thatched church in the hamlet of Sandy Lane at the cost of some £200 and this was completed in November 1892. The building seats up to 50 people. Services of Holy Communion are held on the 2nd and 4th Sundays of each month with additional services at Easter, Advent and Christmas. The electoral role stands at 18.



The musical life of our churches has changed as neither of the churches has a resident organist but do have a number of organists who can be called on for occasional offices and some services. Our music is generally provided by digital and computerised means. Both St Matthews and St Nicholas have choirs which support each other and both churches have a committed band of bellringers.

The Deanery
