West Moors in the Wimborne Deanery enjoys both a rural and suburban outlook, with the New Forest in one direction and the beaches of Hampshire and Dorset in another. With the towns of Ringwood, Bournemouth, Poole and Salisbury all close at hand. There are good transport links directly to the M27 and then to the A34 northwards and M3 to London.

The deanery is extremely supportive and has worked hard in recent years to bring together its suburban, town and rural benefices. The deanery has a clear plan and collaborative leadership.

West Moors church itself has good leadership (Lay and ordained) and has very much adopted the vision of the diocese to Make Jesus Known. We are therefore looking for a community-minded priest who can further develop all that is already happening in the benefice to enable the church to reach out into the local community, and continue to welcome all ages into its life and fellowship. Church, school and community are vital in meeting local needs and to bring about community transformation. The new incumbent should be able to form creative partnerships for mission and ministry and to help people in their journey of discipleship, including children and young people.

In turn the benefice offers a warm welcome, a willingness to work with and support the incumbent. There are excellent schools and leisure activities for all ages on the doorstep, including Moors Valley Country Park.

Ministry in Dorset is rewarding and enjoyable. In recent years significant changes have been made in the way clergy are supported and encouraged, leading to a greater sense of collegiality.



Where are we?

West Moors is situated between Ringwood (5 miles) and Poole (12 miles) and close to Wimborne (5 miles), Bournemouth (10 miles) and Christchurch (13 miles), with easy access to the A31. West Moors is perfectly placed, adjoining open countryside with riverside, meadow, heathland and plantation walks, but also in touch with the conurbation, nearby coastal resorts and the New Forest.

There was considerable expansion in the village about 40 years ago and there is a good mix of housing with modest family



homes, spacious detached houses, flats for social housing, bungalows attracting retired people and sheltered housing, with some pockets of often hidden deprivation. There are Residential and Care Homes and some housing for military families.

West Moors was designated a town in 2021 but is still referred to and has the atmosphere of a village. With a population of approximately 7,500, West Moors is a popular residential area for those working in the surrounding towns and with the retired who move into the area. The attractive centre has benefited from refurbishment in recent years and there are several specialist shops, including a butcher, as well as three small supermarkets (Spar, Tesco and Morrisons). Ferndown, only a mile away, provides more shops and larger supermarkets (Lidl and Sainsbury's and Tesco). There are also two pubs, four lovely coffee shops and a bakery, a doctor's surgery, a dentist, a pharmacy and a civic cemetery. West Moors Parish Council has a Parish Office in the centre of the village. Several charity organisations, including Coping With Chaos and Community Larder, have their base in West Moors.

There are three schools in the village (two First Schools and a Middle School), and two Pre-Schools, an active library, a small Youth Club with its own premises, a multi-use games area, football pitches and pavilion and newly built skateboard park, two children's playgrounds, open-air exercise equipment, a Guide Hall and a Scout Hut. The Memorial Hall, opposite the church, provides a venue for many of the numerous clubs and associations catering for a wide range of ages and activities. West Moors is a friendly place to live, with a very strong community spirit.

- Away Days and Quiet Days provide opportunities to strengthen our spiritual life

Care for Creation

Eco-Church

St Mary's is committed to being an Eco-church and we have a committee that helps us to focus on environmental issues, caring for Creation and being good Stewards of God's World.

This forms part of our teaching throughout the year. We have recently been awarded the **A Rocha Silver Eco-church Award**, building on our previous Bronze.

- Our modern Church Hall is fully insulated and double glazed and also, we generate electricity from our PV panels on the hall roof. The church lighting is LED.
- We are a recognised Fairtrade church, using fairly traded products in church social activities
- We have made a commitment to not use any disposable plates or cups during our social activities.
- We endeavour to promote recycling both in and outside the church, including participating in a crisp packet recycling scheme.
- The churchyard is managed as part of the Living Churchyard Scheme. We are blessed with rare orchids and our gardener manages the churchyard to ensure

these rare orchids (and the creatures that depend on them) flourish.

- We have a Bug Church that was constructed and filled by our (h)ALL@4 congregation, and which is sited within the churchyard.
- Members of the congregation participate in tree planting schemes run by the local Town Council, and we also recently planted 'The Jubilee Tree' an Irish Yew planted to mark the Platinum Jubilee of the late Queen.





LOVING OUR COMMUNITY

We are a welcoming church.

Wherever someone is coming from and wherever they are going, they are welcome at St Mary's. We embrace a wide range of views within our church family.

Some of the ways we act out our inclusivity:

As a **Roofbreaker** church, St Mary's actively welcomes people with diverse abilities and we are committed to empowering the gifts of everyone. (info@throughtheroof.org).

We are a **Dementia Friendly** church and have strong links with West Moors Dementia Action Group. Four times a year as part of Churches Together in West Moors, we hold a **Forget Me Not service**, a gentle and inclusive service for those living with memory loss and their families and carers.

An Autism Friendly service – a short and very gentle and relaxed service, in collaboration with Sturts Community Trust and The Lantern Community, is held occasionally in church – and has been up to once a month - followed by refreshments.

St Mary's actively supports the **Gypsy**, **Roma and Traveller community** in West Moors and the surrounding area with the issues that matter most to them and we are always available for pastoral support. It is also our great privilege to support the community through baptisms, weddings and funerals.

We have a strong team of Welcomers or Sidespeople and we actively encourage people to stay for coffee after services if they would like to.

We continue to journey along the process of **Living in Love and Faith** having valued the experience of following the course in Lent 2021, which helped us to grow in understanding, love and faith. As in many churches, people in our congregation cover a full spectrum of viewpoints with integrity. As we journey together, we continue to hold love for each other and celebrate the ability to hold difference.

Church Activities

A wide variety of activities providing for the full range of our congregation and beyond, include:

- a monthly Church Breakfast
- a Flower Arranging team
- a monthly Tea @3, with activities and food, provides valued fellowship for members of the wider community including Care Home residents.





 numerous opportunities during the year for sharing food together with meals at Harvest, Easter and many more celebratory occasions

regular social and fund-raising occasions





• a **Knit 'n 'Natter group** has worked on projects providing Twiddle Mitts and Wiggle Worms for those with dementia or anxiety, Trauma Teddies for Ukraine, Layettes for Babies Born Sleeping and baby clothes for Women's Refuge and Child Centres. We are currently knitting scarves, gloves and hats for the Salvation

Army's support for people who are homeless in Bournemouth.

St Mary's has an active and vibrant Mothers' Union group which meets monthly. The Mothers' Union is very important in bringing a global aspect to our church life, running events to raise funds in support of local, diocesan and overseas MU Projects.

Community and Outreach

The people of St Mary's are involved in a number of outreach activities.

We are committed to supporting others, both here in this country and overseas.

- Nursery in June 2021. The idea of the Sharing Shed, sited at the entrance to the Church Hall and available 24 hours a day, is that it is a place where we can gift food items when we have plenty but more importantly take food items away when we are a little short. It is not a foodbank but it is a true place of sharing Christ's love, of giving and receiving. No need to ask and no questions asked. Now we are looking to support the Castleman Community Larder, a new initiative in West Moors, which might change the way we operate the Sharing Shed.
- Sturts Farm We have worked steadily to establish a bond with this local community which enables supported living and is passionate about the environment. Seasonal shared worship is fun and uplifting, as in the



Palm Sunday Pilgrimage walk around the farm.

• **Soup Lunches during Lent** raise money for Christian Aid with pupils from St Mary's First School assisting with serving.



- Lent Charity- each year the congregation is invited to make a donation to a chosen local charity in recent years, Christians Against Poverty in Ferndown, Multiple Sclerosis Society in West Parley and Coping With Chaos in West Moors. Visiting speakers from these organisations have been inspiring.
- We also throughout the year give financial support to charities with which we have strong links MAF (Mission Aviation Fellowship), Friends of St James Mission & School Zimbabwe, Myra's Wells and Mission Direct in Uganda and various charities closer to home.
- Children's Society We support the work of the Children's Society throughout the year and especially at Christmas in conjunction with St Mary's First School and Nursery.
- The profit from our parish events is tithed to support chosen charities.
- St Mary's Monkeys our Church Hall provides a space for local Mums and Carers to run a Baby and Toddler Group each week.



Communications

Communication and engagement with our congregation and wider community developed markedly with the use of digital technology, through the pandemic.

- Streamed services the Sunday 10:00am service, live-streamed on Facebook, is an integral part of our church family life, providing wider engagement and enabling housebound members of our congregation to access church.
- **Pew sheet** every week circulated digitally with some hard copies in church, helps with everyday notices, weekly events, prayer lists etc.
- Magazine The monthly 28 page Parish Magazine is very much a community magazine with regular contributions from the schools and village organisations.
 It is now hybrid with primarily digital circulation and about 200 copies printed in the Parish Office distributed free of charge through local shops and library.
- Our parish website and Facebook page aim to widen our communication.
- **Advent card** a card with details of all the services and seasonal events at Christmas has been delivered to every home in the village at the beginning of Advent with an invitation to all.
- **Email circulation** a list of church members, friends and many in the wider community receive regular news and information.
- **Telephone calls** a group of callers with an allocated list of contacts helps to support and keep in touch with potentially lonely and vulnerable members.

Our Life Within the Local Christian Community

Churches Together

We cooperate with our friends in the other churches in West Moors. Meetings have been on a regular basis to share matters of common concern. Our Vicar was the most recent Chair of **CTWM**





We are united in leading open air services on the village Petwyn for Remembrance Day and Carols on the Petwyn at Christmas. These are very significant events in the West Moors calendar and in recent years have attracted gatherings of around 2,000 people of all ages.

Our Life Within the Wider Diocese

We are very involved in the wider life of the Diocese of Salisbury with three active representatives on Wimborne Deanery Synod, one of whom is Lay Chair. The Chair of Salisbury Diocese House of Laity and member of Diocesan Synod – and a Lay Canon of Salisbury cathedral – is also an active member of our congregation. Church members are active in the Mothers' Union both at Deanery and Diocesan level, with two elected Diocesan Trustees and three members on the Deanery Committee.

LOVING OUR CHURCH

What are our Services like?

St Mary's has a strong middle of the road Anglican tradition with vestments worn and the Common Worship Lectionary and Common Worship Liturgy used for most services.

But we also embrace a Mixed Ecology approach to Worship, with a variety of types of service.

- Sung Parish Eucharist on Sunday at 10am with a small robed choir, followed by refreshments in the Hall.
- Said Celebration of Holy Communion every Sunday at 8am using the Book of Common Prayer a strong, regular congregation, with active and committed members of our church family.

- Sunday @10 on the fourth (and fifth) Sunday of the month at Sunday@10 the service takes a lighter and more interactive feel with a worship band. We also use a nave altar and share home-made bread during the Eucharist. And followed by refreshments in our church hall.
- h(ALL)@4 on the first Sunday of the month, a relatively new café-style church service at 4pm in the church hall, with worship songs and a fun and relaxed style...and of course there is coffee and cake!



- Daily Prayer is integral to the life of our church and on Thursday and Friday there is **Morning Prayer** at 8.30am in church.
- **Tuesday@9** A chance to explore the Gospel for the following Sunday in the context of a short service of Morning Prayer.
- Said Celebration of Holy Communion (Common Worship Order 1) a relaxed and gentle service on Wednesday at 10am in the Church Hall followed by coffee and cake.
- All baptised people are invited and encouraged to take communion at these services and young people are prepared to receive communion from the age of 7.

During the year there is a variety of different styles of worship as we celebrate the church seasons. For example

 In Advent, Carol Praise with seasonal readings, Festival of Lessons and Carols, Family Crib Service and Midnight Mass.



In Holy Week, Compline every evening, a Supper on Maundy Thursday before
the Eucharist of The Last Supper and Foot-washing, Solemn Good Friday Liturgy
with Veneration of the Cross, Easter Sunday Dawn Service and more. The
beginning of Lent is marked with an evening service burning the palm crosses
and followed with services on Ash Wednesday offering the Imposition of Ashes.

- Ascension Day Dawn service followed by breakfast.
- All Souls service of Memorial and Hope.
- Special occasions, national and seasonal, are an opportunity to welcome the wider community to join us in church.
- Occasional offices with a particularly strong funeral ministry.



And our music?

- We sing a variety of traditional and modern hymns, worship songs and Taize chants from our pew hymn books 'Complete Anglican Hymns Old and New'.
- There is a traditional two manual organ with a regular organist and two assistants.
 An electric keyboard is also used regularly within services.
- A small but dedicated robed choir helps to
 lead the singing and they occasionally sing an anthem after communion.
- An augmented choir with invited singers from other local choirs sings for special occasions.



A small band plays at our more informal services.





Church and Young People



We encourage children and young people to take a full part in the life of St Mary's Parish Church.

Young people are welcome at all our services and there is a children's area with plenty of toys and books



Schools

We enjoy a close relationship with St Mary's C of E First School, across the road from the church. The church and the school are seen very much as St Mary's family. The Vicar has been a Governor at the school, has been Vice-chair of the Local Governing Committee and has also been a Trustee of the Heath Academy Trust. Members of the church also serve on these committees. The school community worships in the church on a termly basis as part of the school's liturgical year. The established pattern is that members of the Ministry Team lead collective worship in school on a weekly basis. Students also take part in some of the social events, like the Lent Lunches.

The family of church and school have a shared vision of reaching out to, and believing in better for the community of West Moors. We work in partnership in exciting ways to live out that shared vision; The Sharing Shed is a notable outcome of this partnership. Church and school have been working with Sturts Community Trust as West Moors Community Group. This partnership promises to be an exciting initiative in the community which looks at food education and community cohesion.

The Ministry Team also takes assemblies at West Moors Middle School and we are proud to support the wonderful education that is provided to the young people of West Moors

We firmly believe that the collaboration between our school and the church is vital for fostering a nurturing and inclusive educational environment rooted in shared values and spiritual guidance.

The support that the church community has shown to our school has been invaluable. Through various initiatives, events, and partnerships, they have consistently demonstrated their commitment to our students' well-being, growth, and educational journey. Their involvement in our school life, such as leading worship, providing pastoral care, and organising community outreach, has greatly enriched the experiences of our students and staff.

Furthermore, our shared vision of "Believe in better, be more awesome - for anything is possible with God" serves as a guiding principle for our collaborative efforts. It reminds us that with faith, determination, and the support of the church community, our students can develop their full potential and become positive contributors to society.

The relationship between St Mary's Church and St Mary's CE First School & Nursery is integral to our shared mission of providing a holistic education that nurtures the mind, body, and spirit. Together, we believe in creating a supportive, inclusive, and inspiring environment where our students can thrive academically, emotionally, and spiritually.

What are our buildings like?

St Mary's church was built in 1897, extended in 1926 and is in a very good state of repair, with all Quinquennial targets met. In the last twelve vears the church. including both vestries, had a thorough has refurbishment with new lighting, heating and



new carpet, professional cleaning and decorating and stripping and polishing of the original parquet and tiled floors. More recently a new audio system was installed with wi-fi and live streaming equipment.

The adjoining Church Hall, replacing a leaking flat-roofed 70's extension, was built and paid for in 2010. Over half the cost was raised by donations from congregation and



local residents with the rest funded by the sale of land on which stood the former small wooden church of St John's within the parish, declared unsafe and demolished in 2000.



The kitchen has a 5 star 'Score on the Door' rating and over 16 members of the congregation have the Food Hygiene certificate.



A paid groundsman and church cleaner, who is also a member of the congregation and on PCC, keeps the church and surrounding churchyard in good order, with grass and bushes well managed as a Living Churchyard.

The church building is open to visitors most days.

The Vicarage - maybe your home?

The vicarage offers a large, detached, centrally-heated house with a good-sized garden and double garage. There are two large reception rooms, one with an open fireplace, and a spacious study. The kitchen has an adjoining utility room there are two downstairs and cloakrooms. Upstairs there are four bedrooms and a shower/bathroom. The vicarage is on a very pleasant residential road some 15 minutes' walk from the church and 7 minutes from the village centre shops.



Church Organisation and Finance

- There is a strong and active PCC with two Church Wardens, two Deputy Church Wardens, and a Lay Chair. A Standing Committee with strong lay leaders creates a very collegiate style of working.
- The Parish Share, through very careful management and stewardship, has been and is paid in full. A Stewardship Campaign took place in 2021. The Parish Planned Giving scheme involves approximately 70% of the households on



- the Electoral Roll and of these over 75% give under the GiftAid scheme. Last year we introduced a card payment machine which is increasingly used at services and events. The church is registered with the Charity Commission.
- As with many churches, the Covid pandemic had an effect on finances as has the sharp rise in fuel costs. We are working to reduce and eliminate an annual deficit but the fabric of the church is in good condition and bequests restricted to this area will provide more than adequate support. The small number of items raised in the quinquennial inspection have been addressed.
- We passed the triennial Periodic Archdeacon's Inspection in 2022 and our paperwork and practices were found to be in good order.

- Safeguarding is a standing item on the PCC agenda. Policies and guidance are
 updated regularly in line with Diocesan and House of Bishops' requirements.
 Our Safeguarding Representative, trained by the diocese, has run courses at St
 Mary's and in the Deanery. Those requiring DBS checks have completed these
 and Safeguarding training as necessary. This includes the whole PCC as
 Trustees as well as Church officers and those leading activities for children and
 vulnerable adults.
- The requirements on data protection were addressed in a letter to all on the Electoral Roll, inviting their agreement on the church's use of data.
- Health and Safety is well managed and monitored.
- Printing is all done in-house on the church's own printer and collator.
- A Parish Administrator is paid for 15 hours per month.

Looking to the Future

There is much to celebrate in the life of our parish – as demonstrated in this Profile. But there is a job to be done here in West Moors.

- Over the last few years, we have lost some key members of our congregation –
 some moving to be nearer family, and others called home to the Father.
 Children of core members of our congregation have grown up or moved away.
 Part of a familiar cycle over the years and we look forward with trust, prayer
 and new vision to a period of regrowth.
- We have a good financial record, but, as with many churches, sustainable finances have become an area of concern in the last year as energy costs rose and Parish Share increases. As we look to the future this will need to be addressed.
- We have people with energy, vision and commitment and we are excited at the prospect of building on our strengths and moving forward.
- It is a good point in our journey for us to reflect, to review our Mission and take some steps in a new direction especially as we engage with the new Salisbury Diocesan Vision *Making Jesus Known*.

Maybe you are the one to lead us on that journey!

And what can we build on or do better?

- Our children's work needs re-thinking and re-energising. Groups for children, such as Messy Church and a small social group for young teenagers have recently been discontinued during the Vacancy. We need a new vision and a new direction.
- Discipleship making confident, courageous Christians; Alpha course / other courses.
- Review Worship explore new and various styles of worship.
- Develop school links. There are three schools in West Moors; we have a strong relationship with one but limited engagement with the other two. Maybe exploring mentoring, chaplaincy, mental health/well-being support for young people.
- Build on our Bereavement Ministry.
- Further community engagement outdoor events / services / topical discussion, talks and forums.
- Explore the potential of technology and digital communication to support us in doing God's work.


