Where we've come from

We are an offshoot of the Sudan Link, set up nearly 30 years ago by the then Bishop of Salisbury John and Jill Baker.





What we do

With funding primarily from giving within the Diocese we organise:-

- the sending of primary health care kits – basic medicines - to ECS clinics.
- the training of medical assistants, nurses, community midwives, laboratory assistants, refresher courses for community health workers.
- the construction and equipping of ECS clinics.
- support for the ECS Health Commission in delivering primary health care to its people and local communities.



Where we do it

Mainly in South Sudan but also the North, where we are able to do it effectively.

How we do it

The Sudan Link is one of prayer and fellowship, so we pray for our Sudanese brothers and sisters in Christ and for God's Spirit to guide and inform our work.

- Just two UK volunteers, an administrator & a medical advisor.
- Regular visits mean fellowship, too, as well as monitoring how our funding is being used.

What is the impact?

- Medical workers trained through us prescribe and dispense basic medicines supplied by Salisbury and others to treat & cure minor but disabling & chronic ailments where no other facilities exist.
- Once trained, our community midwives will reduce the Maternal Mortality Rate – currently amongst the highest in the world.
- The growing awareness that someone from a long way away cares for disadvantaged communities in remote regions.
