They are familiar with the 'I AM' sayings of John's gospel and can explain some of the metaphors used with understanding. • Pupils know that Christians believe that Jesus' life offers a pattern for humans and models the way Christians should live. They can use their understanding of contemporary Christian worship to illustrate Christian belief in Jesus as God incarnate and how this is linked to God's interest in, care and love of the poor and vulnerable. They can compare contrast and evaluate the success of contemporary worship styles in communicating central ideas like God incarnate with worship in range of denominational traditions. • They can explain the use of artwork to expresses complex ideas (such as Body Theology) and its contemporary relevance.

They can compare and contrast contemporary worship styles with worship in range of denominational traditions.</p>	Excelling  <p>Using this knowledge and understanding pupils can raise relevant questions in response to their enquiry into the question 'Why do Christians believe Jesus is God on earth? Pupils are able to evaluate the success of worship and artwork in using metaphor to express complex theological ideas such as Body Theology. They can make connections from Christian beliefs about incarnation to contemporary debates about themes such as body image, sex, food and physical pleasure. They can express their own ideas with supporting arguments.</p>
